tion, He, in His grace, will forgive what has been done. It is not His design that one should


hold oneself accountable for something done years before. In God's eyes it is as if there is no sin remaining, only a spotless garment.

Faithfulness- What Is It?

Faithfulness is being unswerving in purpose and goal. It implies, therefore, having goals and purposes for life, and never changing from those goals for a minute.

However, those purposes and goals must originate in the mind of God. Many people have goals and plans and work day and night with singleness of purpose to accomplish them. Though that is commendable, it doesn't necessarily follow that the goals and purposes toward which they strive themselves are from God. How terrible for a believer to sacrifice his energy, his time, his mental powers, his family and his fortune in pursuit of a goal that God did not design!

Ephesians 2:10 reveals that God has a purpose for every saved person. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them.

The two important words in this verse are before ordained. Before refers back to the time before we were created in Christ Jesus--that is, the time when we were still lost in our sins. Thus, before we were ever saved, God had a plan of good works in which He had ordained that we should walk. The word ordained is literally prepared, blue -printed, determined. That is, before we were saved, God had a blue print already prepared for our life. He had a job for us to do, a path for us to walk, and a goal for us to reach. He then saved us to walk that path, to do that job, and to reach that goal.

Christian friends, do you know what that goal is? Do you know what God has saved you to do? Are you pressing toward that goal? Are you faithful in pursuing His goal for your life, or are you side- tracked? Obviously, we don't know where the path will lead in the future. We can only see one day at a time. But we can determine to know and to reach His goal as He reveals it to us daily. Are you constantly praying about God's will? Do you seek His leadership daily? Can you say with all confidence that the plans, goals, and dreams you presently have are from God?
